35	bridges, roads, rail system, high-speed internet, and electricity are essential to the public safety,					
36	economic viability, and equity of all citizens in every part of Illinois. The persistent digital divide					
37	in Illinois is a barrier to the economic competitiveness in the economic distribution of essential					
38	public services, including health care and education. This digital divide disproportionately					
39 40	affects communities of color, lower-income areas, and rural areas. The purpose of the Broadband
